Our primary elections are on June 5th. Your vote in the primary election will determine the candidates for several national and local representatives. As you may know, Boulevard Park was included in the new City Council District 4 after redistricting. This seat has been held by Councilmember Rob King Fong, who is not seeking reelection. The primary vote is therefore especially important for our neighborhood to determine who the candidates will be for our district and who will represent our interests at City Council. There are also two propositions on the ballot: Proposition 28—Limits on state lawmakers' terms of office and Proposition 29—Tobacco Tax increase. Remember — the democratic process is still the best form of government in the world, and your vote does make a difference. ## Oh Captain, My Captain! (apologies to Walt Whitman)

You may have wondered how the Park Beat finds its way to your doorstep each month. It's not magic - it's the product of efforts by a chain of BPNA volunteers who create and distribute the newsletter. Each block in the neighborhood has a Block Captain, who drops off a newsletter at each home. (Some Block Captains deliver to multiple blocks, up to 4 blocks in a couple of cases!) Overseeing all the block captains is the Distribution Coordinator (aka, the Captain of Captains), who picks up the printed newsletters from the printer at 16th & E Streets and drops them off at the homes of the individual Block Captains. The packets are pre-packaged and sorted by location. The Coordinator can drop them off in order without having to sort them. Picking up the order from the printer and dropping them off takes about an hour each month.

Hal Edmonds has faithfully served as Captain of Captains for several years and would like to pass the honor and the duties to a new volunteer. All you need is a car and a spare hour at around the end of the month. ## HORROR ON THE LANDING!

If you did not have the original "Rocky Horror Picture Show" experience back in the 1970s, you'll soon have your chance — collect your props, don your costume, and join the jubilant adult audience at a special midnight (well, actually, 11:59 p.m.) showing in Sutter's Landing Park on Saturday, July 21. An outdoor venue below the looming mounds of the old city landfill will be ideal for this famously over-the-top movie, sometimes described as the "longest running release in film history." For the uninitiated — if there are any in Boulevard Park! — recommended props for members of the audience include rice, toast (unbuttered), newspapers, water pistols, flashlights, noisemakers, confetti, toilet paper, and party hats.

"Rocky Horror Picture Show" is the first of several FREE outdoor movies that are being sponsored by Councilman Steve Cohn as part of the annual "Screen on the Green" series (http://sacscreenonthegreen.com/), but it is the only film being shown in the greater Boulevard Park area.



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### It's Not Easy Being Green — Green Thumb Brigade in the Summertime

The Green Thumb Bridge is a small but true-blue (true-green?) volunteer group that tends to the pedestrian islands and traffic circles (now with periodic assistance from city street maintenance). In spring and summer, we weed, trim plants that are too exuberant, and sweep the devices. In fall and winter, we rake leaves and sweep. With temperatures rising, it is time for the Green Thumb Brigade to switch to its summertime hours. Instead of working from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m., the Thumbs will start work at 8 a.m, ending at 10 a.m. to beat the heat.

The Thumbs welcome any and all new members — no expertise in plants needed; we usually have our indefatigable plant advisor Daisy Mah along. We meet in the alley behind 711 22nd Street the third Saturday of every month. While bringing your own trowels, brooms, dustpans, or rakes is helpful, we also share tools, but you should bring your own gardening gloves.

We cannot get to all the devices each month, so we very much welcome the support of those "Anonymous Green Thumbs" who "adopt" a pedestrian island, diverter or traffic circle. In summertime, the most important task is to keep the devices watered — one bucket a week per pedestrian island is all the plants ask. Traffic circles must be watered by hose. #### **Our Good Friend: Vincent Bezdecheck**

Many long-time residents of Boulevard Park know the Vincent Bezdecheck family as part of a group of "restoration pioneers" of the 70s, 80s and 90s, drawn by the beautiful (if often rundown) old houses, moving into the neighborhood when it was challenged by crime, too many drug houses. and other social problems. The current Boulevard Park Neighborhood Association was started in the early 1990s by a group of neighbors passionate about making the neighborhood more livable, taking on issues of reducing and slowing traffic, trying to bring streetlighting to reduce crime and enhance safety, ensuring preservation of the historic homes, and many more. One of those passionate neighbors was Vince Bezdecheck, who worked on all those issues, including serving as Co-Chair of BPNA in the 90s. Vince's interests were wide-ranging and enterprising, including preparing an electrified float for the 1995 city parade celebrating the 100th anniversary of the first electricity delivered from the Folsom Power House to Sacramento – and competing in Eppie's Great Race. He lovingly and painstakingly restored his own historic home, which was featured in the 2009 Sacramento Old City Association Home Tour. Vince, his wife Donna, and their three children have been important fixtures in and supporters of the neighborhood.

Vince has been diagnosed with ALS (amyotrophic lateral sclerosis), also known as Lou Gehrig's Disease. He and his family invite friends and neighbors who would like to keep in contact and send good wishes to go to the CaringBridge website, caringbridge.org, scroll to "Visit a Caring Bridge Website" and enter "vincentbezdecheck1", then hit "visit." You will be asked to enter your email address as a security measure. You can then view Donna's updates on Vince, as well as leave a message for him and the family. Dealing with chronic disease is difficult and wearying; even short messages can lift their spirits. To the Bezdechecks — and to all our neighbors battling disease and other sorrows — we send our heartfelt best wishes.

# The View From the Top: A FORB Report on the Sutter's Landing Landfill

For May's Friends of the River Bank expedition, a group of fifty plus adults and children were given the rare treat of hiking to the highest point in Sacramento – the Sutter's Landing Landfill. Usually off-limits to anyone but city staff, the group climbed the 100+ feet to hear Sacramento's Solid Waste Management Department staff explain how the landfill is maintained and how, due to excellent collaboration between staff, residents and Friends of Sutter's Landing members, it may become a park feature in the future. Fifteen years ago, the landfill's trash was capped by a layer of clay; the clay layer keeps water from getting into the trash and infiltrating the groundwater. The trash below the clay produces methane gas, which used to be used by the Blue Diamond Almond Factory at 17th & C Streets. As the years passed, Blue Diamond switched to natural gas; also, the dump produces less and less methane, which is now burned off in controlled flares. City staff check the clay cap regularly to ensure no water seepage occurs, and they keep the site mowed to reduce fire danger. The site also serves as habitat for mice and other small animals that are forage for resident hawks and coyotes, the mowing actually aids that function. On this trip, critter sightings included a jackrabbit, garter snake, killdeer (leading us away from her nest), red-shouldered hawk, Swainson's hawks on their nest (!), and numerous ducks, geese and other birds in flight.

Corey Brown, a Boulevard Park resident and co-founder of the Friends of Sutter's Landing, and Councilman Steve Cohn, who has been instrumental in creating and protecting Sutter Landing's Park's interests, spoke of the long-term vision for a regional Sutter's Landing Park and how the site may be integrated into the park once the landfill is declared "clean" in

## **Historic Homes of Boulevard Park**

2100 F Street – Joseph Marzen House



Reputed to be designed by Rudolf Herold, a prominent local architect who designed the City Hall, this house was built by Joseph Marzen in 1910 when he was 82 years old. Construction costs on the building permit were estimated at \$9,800. Joseph Marzen was a successful capitalist who first came to Sacramento during the Gold Rush in 1849. After first working in the butcher business, he made his fortune in livestock and banking in Lovelock, Nevada. He and his wife, Catherine, were active in Sacramento civic activities.

This Colonial Revival or Federalist home features Art Nouveau stylized acanthus leaves and flowers on the pilasters and capitals and also as a chimney detail. Other features include projecting cornices, wheel and cross porch railings and leaded glass windows. A full second story wraparound porch is unique to this large formal home. Like many of the larger homes in Boulevard Park, it became a boarding house, in this case for elderly reformed alcoholics. It was purchased by Bonnie Fitzpatrick, a former Senior Vice President of Lyon Realty in 1979 and champion of the value of midtown's historic homes. She extensively restored the house to be a single family home, and graciously opened her home for many community events.

another fifteen years. The site settles a little each year, so this highest ground in Sacramento may be a few feet lower by the time it is open to the public. On this trip, the view of the Sierras was obscured by haze, but local conservationist Randy Smith's photos taken on a clear day showed participants how grand it can be. ### **Five Ways to Improve The Neighborhood**

- Get involved with your neighborhood association. You'll be better informed of issues facing the neighborhood and have a chance to shape, guide and participate in the future of your neighborhood.
- Report crime promptly. Whether the issue is graffiti, petty vandalism, or something much more serious, police cannot act without first hearing about the problem from you.
- Meet the youth on your and greet them by name. This one simple step can help in a crisis where adults and young people need to communicate.
- Turn your porch light on. Do this every night at dusk and keep it on until dawn. Crime tends to decline in well-lit neighborhoods. It also makes the street feel more welcome which communicates that we care about our neighborhood.
- Walk around the block. Neighborhoods benefits when its residents walk around, meet and chat with their neighbors.


