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
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#### 2025 BPNA Board of Directors Candidate Statements

## Washington Elementary School and Its Murals

BPNA's January 2025 Membership Meeting will be held at the Washington Elementary School, an important neighborhood hub that has undergone three transformations. The first school on this site, a massive three-story, steel-and-concrete structure in the Mission Revival style, was built in 1919. Many Sacramento residents remember it well, having attended classes there in the forties, fifties, or sixties. Classroom instruction ceased at the school in 1969, due to concerns about the building's vulnerability to earthquakes. The entire structure was razed and replaced by a cluster of one-story buildings six years later. Due to declining enrollments, that version of Washington Elementary was closed in 2013. Its students were relocated to other city schools. Before they left, the children helped produce portable murals for installation at their new schools. The project, directed by Bay Area artist Milton Bowens, was intended to help the children make the transition from Washington Elementary to the William Land Park and Theodore Judah schools.

Little did those children know that mural painting would be an important feature at the next version of Washington Elementary, a modern STEAM school dedicated to the teaching of science, technology, engineering, art, and math. Rebuilt to facilitate project-based learning and to provide a more welcoming environment, today's school was inaugurated in Fall 2016. One of its most outstanding features now is the array of murals that have been added to its outer walls since the school's reopening. Designed and executed with the collaboration of students, faculty, and professional artists, the new murals further enhance the school's appearance, encouraging passers by to take notice of the campus and even to visit it. The largest mural in the neighborhood (in fact, the largest one in the entire city) is A Journey into Curiosity, on the Eleanor Apartments at 16th and E Streets (2020). The apartment building's east wall overlooks the park behind the school, and Washington students contributed ideas for the murals. Additional murals have been painted on several school buildings. They include Rise, Heal, and Overcome; The Leader in Me; La Lotería del Barrio; and Students and Their Spirit Animals.

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## 2025 City Planning Academy (application deadline: Jan. 24)

If you are a city resident and would like to be more informed about, and engaged in, current city planning issues in Sacramento, this free course could be for you. Current and past BPNA Board members have enjoyed being part of the Planning Academy and recommend the experience highly. Designed to educate Sacramento residents, business owners, and community leaders about how planning shapes our community, the Planning Academy follows a hybrid format, with a combination of discussion, presentations (inperson and via video, Zoom, or podcasts), and interactive group exercises. Presenters at the Academy in past years have included City staff, elected officials, local architects and planning professionals, and building industry leaders. The program lasts eleven weeks. Classes will be held on Monday evenings (starting at 5:30 p.m.) from March 3 until **May 11**. Two Saturday walking tours also will be scheduled. The deadline for submitting applications for the 2025 City Planning Academy is Friday, January 24 (5 p.m.).
